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<u>V+J</u> <u>Third Sunday of Easter</u> <u>April 14, 2024</u> <u>Salesian Reflection</u>

In today's Gospel we come to see how the Disciples' faith is affirmed as they continue to experience Jesus' presence among them. St. Francis de Sales tells us that God also continues to affirm our faith:

So loving is God's hand as it handles our hearts! So skillful is God's hand in bringing its strength to us without depriving us of freedom. God's power gently gives us power as the Holy Spirit pours into our hearts the first rays of the divine light of faith.

These movements of the Spirit are the beginning of holy love. They are the first green buds that the soul, warmed by the Heavenly Sun, begins to put out in the springtime. Joyous, beautiful, and pleasing is this dawn of sacred love. Still it remains true, that the dawn, is not the day. These movements of divine love precede our act of faith. When God gives us faith, God enters into our being and speaks to us by way of inspiration.

Little by little our Lord strengthens the grace that comes to us from divine inspiration. So pleasantly does God propose to us what we must believe that we adhere to the light of truth with a gentle but powerful certitude: *faith alone makes us love and believe in the truth of Christ's love by diffusing a certitude in our mind.* Faith is the best friend of our spirit. For step by step as it were, we are led back to God.

How gently Our Lord proceeds in hearts that consent to serve God throughout their life by keeping the Commandments. I believe that God would give us still more help if it were not because of our failure and the obstacles we place in the way. Therefore, let us be attentive to our progress in the love we owe to God, for then the love that God brings will never be wanting to us, and our faith in Christ will grow just as the Apostles' faith did after the Resurrection.

¡Qué amorosa es mano de Dios cuando sujeta nuestros corazones! Tan experta es Su mano que puede llenarnos con su fuerza sin privarnos de nuestra libertad. El poder de Dios gentilmente nos da poder, mientras que el Espíritu Santo vierte sobre nuestros corazones los primeros rayos de la luz divina de la fe.

Estos movimientos del Espíritu son el principio del amor sagrado. Son los primeros y verdes capullos que brotan del alma en la primavera, y que reciben el calor de un Sol Celestial. Jubiloso, hermoso y gratificante, es este amanecer del amor sagrado. Aún así, es cierto que el amanecer no es el día. Estos movimientos del amor divino anteceden a nuestro acto de fe. Cuando Dios nos da la fe, Él entra en nuestro ser y nos habla a través de las inspiraciones.

Poco por poco nuestro Señor fortalece la gracia que la inspiración divina nos otorga. Dios nos propone de manera amable que debemos creer y aferrarnos a la luz de la verdad con un convencimiento discreto pero poderoso: sólo la fe puede darnos certeza y lograr que amemos y que creamos en la verdad del amor de Dios. La fe es la mejor amiga de nuestro espíritu, ya que paso a paso nos lleva de regreso a Dios.

Qué gentil es nuestro Señor con aquellos corazones que aceptan servir a Dios a través del cumplimiento de los mandamientos a lo largo de sus vidas. Yo creo que Dios nos ayudaría aún más de no ser por nuestras fallas y por los obstáculos que notros mismos colocamos en nuestro camino. Por lo tanto, debemos estar atentos a los avances que hagamos en el amor que le debemos a Dios. Si así lo hacemos, el amor que Dios nos brinda jamás nos parecerá poco, y nuestra fe en Cristo crecerá como creció la fe de los apóstoles después de la Resurrección.

<u>JESUS &</u> COFFEE

Mass, discuss and dive in with some soul searching, joy and laughter. Bring you, your Bible, your eye-opening beverage, and an open heart and mind. A wonderful, meaningful way to start the day!

What is Lectio Divina?

Lectio Divina means sacred reading, and it's a powerful way to pray with the Bible. Instead of just Scripture, *Lectio Divina* helps you really dive into the story and understand God's message for your life.

The Historic Origins of Lectio Divina

Lectio Divina originated in the third century and was a special favorite in Catholic monasteries – but it isn't just for priests, monks, and nuns! After being popularized in the very early church, it remained popular for hundreds of years. During the Second Vatican Council in 1965 and later in 2005, the Church mentioned Lectio Divina as an especially powerful way of praying with the Bible.

How to Pray with Lectio Divina

It's important to remember that Lectio Divina is not a Bible Study, where you research and interpret the Bible from a theological or historical perspective. Rather, Lectio Divina is a personal conversation with God through scripture. From Brother Mickey McGrath, OSFS... Saints who may also be heroes, heroines. There is also a new film about her, "Cabrini" playing in US theaters.



CABRINI

I have always found St. Frances Cabrini to be a woman of incredible courage and spiritual depth and substance, and that was reaffirmed yesterday when I saw the film CABRINI. Even though I am not typically one to do movie reviews, I cannot recommend it enthusiastically enough.

Italian immigrants in her day were just as maligned, feared, and abused as are immigrants today. St Francesca Cabrini, because she rose above the fear-filled mob mentality- and clericalism- of her times is a relevant model of Christlike commitment to social justice and Catholic social teaching in our world today.

She taught herself English and, despite a fear of water, crossed the ocean 25 times. Francesca also founded 67 charitable institutions across the Americas, 8 in the US alone.

She became a US citizen in Seattle in 1916.

Two of my favorite quotes of hers, which I learned years ago, are:

"Give me a heart as big as the universe."

and

"The bigger the problem, the stronger I become. For now I simply want a plate of rice Milanese and a cold beer."
